We cannot be satisfied fitting into societal norms or accruing "American Dream" success when the world is full of people who do not even have access to the Gospel.

So what does "radical involvement" look like today? Where do we need to depart from the customary in our everyday lives and as an organization?

This issue of *Tarheel Talk* explores some of the ways WMU NC is boldly departing from the customary. From volunteering in hard places and giving sacrificially to updating our modes of communication, we are excited to see what God can do when we are willing to be radically involved in His mission.

# WMWAround the World



n May, I had the privilege to be on a Zoom call with ten other countries that have WMU. It was such a delight to hear from representatives from Ghana, Japan, Taiwan, Mozambique, Nigeria, Cambodia, Singapore, Cuba, and Kenya. WMU is in 50 countries altogether! You are a part of something huge and great!

We praise God for the faithful missionaries who took WMU with them when they went to their assigned fields. It has flourished all over the world, and each country makes it relevant for themselves and their needs.

The first speaker was from **Ghana**. They just had a very large Prayer Summit with 2,000 women, and then



a GA conference with 1,000 girls! After the GA meeting, the girls went out to evangelize on the streets and in homes, carrying a sign that read, "You're not alone. Jesus is with you." Then they visited an orphanage. Ghana has a large Christian camp, but two of the dormitories have burnt down. Because of this, women sleep outside in the rain and in the hallways. Ghana's WMU's prayer is for funds to rebuild the dormitories.

Secondly, we heard from WMU in **Nigeria**, which is celebrating its 105th anniversary. They have Sunbeams and GA's, and 10,000 women recently attended a 3-day WMU event. The women travel to different cities for meetings and celebrations, yet travel is always a problem. Nigeria's economy is very bad and many people cannot afford food. Because of hunger, there are many beggars and homeless people.



What a joy it was to see five women from **Mozambique** where I served as a missionary! They have started a Literacy program for the women who were never allowed to attend school. The WMU groups take up dues to pay the teachers. They also have a needy pastor's project and try to support as many pastors as they can. Their prayer request is for God to move among the Islamic terrorists in the north of the country where many people have been killed. National WMU just got the contact number for a WMU leader in Mozambique, and this was their first time on the call.



The WMU in **Taiwan** will have their Annual meeting soon and 300 will be in attendance. They also partner with the IMB to send missionaries from Taiwan to other countries.

**Cuba** is celebrating the 110th anniversary of having WMU in their country. Their prayer request is that it is hard for all the women to gather as there are 4,195 islands! Transportation is a challenge!

In **Japan**, they are celebrating their anniversary as they began in 1920. They recently had a country meeting with 400 women in attendance. The population of Japan is decreasing. So is the number of churches. They asked for prayer for this and for the financial problems in Japan that are causing a shortage of all necessities.

**Singapore** just had a change in government and they voted in a new Prime Minister. They are very concerned about the new Minister and are waiting to see if he will allow freedom of religion. Please pray for this right, and that more young women will be involved in WMU in Singapore.

**Cambodia** reported that the nearby countries of Malaysia and the Philippines have been helping them with their WMU. A WMU missionary from the Philippines has been sent to work in Cambodia. Pray for their first WMU assembly in November.

In the Philippines, the WMU gave 20 chickens to 30 church planters, so they don't have to worry about feeding their families.


Finally, we heard from **Kenya**. They have been discipling their members through a country-wide Bible study. 3,000 participated! After a woman and a young girl finish their study together, they are commissioned and given a WMU headscarf. A recent flood in Kenya took 500 lives, and thousands are now homeless. Due to Kenya's economy, it is difficult for people to buy food for themselves or to help those in need. Their prayer concern is for missionaries to be called to serve in Africa.

Pray for your sisters around the world. One day we will all be around Jesus' throne with people from every country praising the Lord. He is the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords! Let's praise His name together.

# Serving the World at Home

eing involved in international missions doesn't require a passport or an airplane ticket. For the last 15 years, North Carolina has been a hub for immigration and refugee resettlement. In college towns, our state schools host hundreds of international students each semester. People from all over the world walk by us on the sidewalk, shop alongside us at the grocery store, and sit beside our children in classrooms.

#### "The nations" are in our backyard. All we have to do is walk out the door.

WMU North Carolina has a heart for reaching the nations. That's why we partner with the International Mission Board and pray for missionaries and WMUs around the world. That's also why we partner with the North American Mission Board, NC Baptists, Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, and churches like North Raleigh International Baptist Church to reach internationals right here at home.

If you have a heart for international missions, WMU NC can connect you with places to get involved. We have hands-on opportunities (*like those shared on these pages*) where you can be an international missionary right here in our state. Or, if you feel called to GO, we can also connect you to sending organizations or mission trips to locations and people groups around the globe.

Someday, people from every nation, tribe, and tongue will worship before the throne of God (Revelation 7:9-10). What role will you have played in the gospel reaching these worshippers?

#### **Facts**

- According to the U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigrants (USCRI), "Refugees resettled in North Carolina come primarily from Bhutan, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Eritrea, Iraq, Russia, Somalia, Syria, and Ukraine."
- In April 2024 alone, 238 refugees from 15 different countries arrived in North Carolina<sup>2</sup>
- Guilford County hosts two "Newcomer Schools" specifically for school-aged children of refugees and immigrants. Students at the Newcomer Schools focus on English as a Second Language (ESL) classes and skills for navigating American culture in addition to other academic subjects. Students eventually transition to their local public schools.
- Churches throughout the state offer ESL classes and tutoring for internationals in their area.
- Near college towns, some churches host programs, such as the Piedmont International Fellowship,<sup>3</sup> where families "adopt" international students. American families invite internationals to worship with them and share in holiday celebrations and family traditions. They aim to be their "home away from home" and pray these students will come to know Christ so they can carry the gospel back to their country when they are finished studying.

#### **NRIBC Health Clinic**

Though necessary, many people don't have access to sufficient healthcare opportunities. For resettled refugees, language and educational barriers make this even more challenging. North Raleigh International Baptist Church (NRIBC) partners with multiple organizations, including WMU NC, to help refugees in their community access critical educational opportunities, screenings, mental health assessments, and medical care during Free Health Fairs offered several times a year.

The spring fair took place on Saturday, April 27. In addition to the Health Clinic offerings, the fair featured a prayer station, a food giveaway, and a thrift store of items donated and transported to Raleigh by WMU NC members (and husbands!) from Fruitland Baptist Church. Amy Boone and Barbara Hill joined several other WMU NC ladies to volunteer in the thrift store, talking and praying with guests throughout the day.

Our prayer is that, as we work with NRIBC and other organizations to meet the physical needs of the refugee community, God will open opportunities for us to share the gospel. Pray for NRIBC as they pour into this community and for other churches to be the hands and feet of Jesus to the many other communities like this in our state.

# Honoring God's Heart for the Peoples of the Earth: International Children's Camp

f you've ever been on any camp staff, you know the secret of all secrets...camp life is hard, but it's worth it. It's early mornings, and late nights, and cabin chants, and nature walks, and smiles, and sometimes meltdowns, and obstinance, and saying "YOU DO HAVE TO TAKE A SHOWER TODAY," and always, always it's making Jesus known.

At the end of June, I had the privilege of helping lead the International Children's Camp at Camp Mundo Vista. I saw faces from Thailand, Burundi, Congo, Sudan, Kenya, Nigeria, Somalia, Tanzania, Eritrea, and America just to name a few. Many of these children are refugees or the children of refugees. I heard Swahili, French, Thai, and several other languages I could not

identify. I also heard the stories of how these children are treated daily at school and in life. I heard them describe often being treated as "less than" because of the way they speak or the tone of their skin. I encountered the skepticism and guardedness that teens have when approached by those outside their culture and experiences. I also experienced the open hearts of elementary school children who have not yet put on that armor to protect themselves from the world.

We host International Children's Camp for both of these groups. For the wary and for the wanting; for the hurting and for the hopeful. This is the hard work of missions. Sometimes it is saying, "I'm sorry you've been hurt," and other times it is simply saying "let's play."

Vance Pitman, Send Network President, said this year, "We are planting churches with a heart for the nations because God's heart is for the peoples of the earth." Similarly, Annie Armstrong said, "God is bringing the nations of the world to America...the need for chapels and other help

is immediate." International Children's Camp is where we celebrate and honor God's heart for the peoples of the earth. It is a place outside of the politics of the world; a place where the stranger is welcomed, where Jesus speaks through play, and where hungry mouths are fed. It is not an easy ministry, but I have to believe it is exactly the place that Annie Armstrong would have been and these are exactly the kind of children that Fannie Heck would have ministered to.

God willing, next year I will get to sit on the floor of a cabin again and share Jesus with both children in Hijabs and with those in unicorn headbands. The need for volunteers is immediate and your churches can help. This year First Baptist Church, Asheboro and Antioch Baptist Church, Lillington sent their youth ministers and volunteers to lead games on two of the camp days. They were quite literally an answer to prayer. Prayerfully consider bringing a team or just yourself next year. The nations will be there. Will you join us?



# Celebrating the Life and Legacy of Delores Thomas: A Beacon of Radical Service and Love

This past May, WMU NC bid farewell to one of its most beloved and dedicated members, Delores (Dee) Thomas. Her legacy of unwavering commitment and service to the Great Commission left an indelible mark on all who knew her. As we reflect on her life, we celebrate the profound impact she made through her service, love, and dedication to missions.

Delores Thomas grew up in Peachland, North Carolina, next door to Deep Springs

Baptist Church, where her faith journey began. After studying business administration at Kings College and earning a bachelor of science degree in business and religion from Wingate University, Delores dedicated 36 years of her professional life to the administrative staff at Wingate.

Dee's husband of 60 years, Richard, shared her passion for service. Together, they were described as "pillars" of Deep Springs Baptist Church, contributing to every area from choir to Sunday School and missions leadership.

Delores' influence extended far beyond her church. She and Richard were active in multiple community organizations; however, their primary focus was always on missions. They embraced the call to be witnesses locally, statewide, nationally, and internationally.

For over forty years, Delores and Richard led by example, teaching and impacting generations of youth. Their handson service included countless hours building and renovating at Camp Mundo Vista, building ramps, landscaping for local senior adults, disaster relief efforts in North Carolina, and mission trips across the United States and beyond. They traveled to Alaska, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New York, Utah, Vermont, Wisconsin, Africa, Armenia, and

Lebanon to share the gospel, train leaders, and provide disaster recovery and renewal.

WMU NC was profoundly blessed by Dee's ministry. She held every significant role within the organization, from WMU Director for the Anson Association to president of WMU NC, and vice president of the National WMU Executive Board. She also served as the coordinator of Missions Carolina for five years, facilitating hands-on missions experiences for others. Her leadership was characterized by humility, dedication, and an unwavering commitment to the mission.

Dee was an ardent supporter of WMU NC, contributing not just her time and effort but also her finances. She and Richard gave faithfully and encouraged others to give to the Heck Jones Offering and through the WMU Foundation. For all of their contributions, both financial and in service, Delores and Richard received the NC Baptist Heritage Award in 2023.

Dee was known as the person who would do whatever, whenever, for anybody. "She loved everyone and never met a stranger," former EDT Ruby Fulbright reflected. She was also incredibly encouraging and had a special way of making people feel seen and loved. "She would look into your eyes before pulling you in for a hug," remembered former WMU NC president Deborah Taylor.

Dee lived out WMU NC's mission statement to "challenge, prepare, and equip Christian believers to be radically involved in the fulfillment of the Great Commission." Her legacy is one of radical service and love.

# Being a Lucy



rowing up there was a woman named Lucy Jenkins who was the adult I would talk to when I didn't feel like I could talk with my parents. She was always nonjudgmental and willing to kindly

show me other ways of looking at things (ie -how I was wrong!). She taught Acteens, her husband taught me how to drive a stick shift, and she was always happy to see me.

I look at my teenage boys and wonder who in the church will be their Lucy? Who will be there to correct

them with love? Who will be there to cheer them on and celebrate alongside them?

So how can we go about being Lucy for the youth in our lives?

Connecting with teens is all about building relationships that are authentic and meaningful.

First off, "Lucys" have an attitude that is relaxed and welcoming. Teens need a space where they feel like they belong, where they can kick back and be themselves without feeling judged.

Next, "Lucys" are excellent listeners.

Teens have a lot on their minds –
questions about life, faith, relationships
– you name it. So, lend an ear, without
jumping in with all the answers.


Sometimes, just having someone listen
can make a huge difference.

And of course, it's all about building relationships. "Lucys" get to know each teen personally – what they're into, what makes them tick, and what's going on in their lives. Grab a pizza after church or hang out at a local coffee shop. Show them that you care about them as individuals. Attend their concerts, ballgames, dance recitals...whatever they are into. Sit with them at church dinners or chaperone a youth trip.

In the end, it's not about being formal or following a strict program – it's about being real, listening, and building genuine connections that help teens grow in their faith and navigate the crazy journey of adolescence.

There may just be a teen you know that needs a Lucy. And you can be that for them.


#### Here are just a few of the highlights from this year's conference:

# From Sunbeams to Service: My Journey Through WMU

Queen Regent in Service as I immersed myself in serving others and sharing the Gospel.

After marrying my best friend, Paul Hill, I felt called to give back to the organization that had given me so much. I began teaching GAs and Acteens, passing on the knowledge and passion for missions to the next generation. As my

two daughters joined GAs and Acteens, we embarked on a family journey of taking mission trips together, believing it to be the best way to teach our children about missions



firsthand. While we modeled a lifestyle of living on mission, by loving our neighbors in our community daily, by serving our cashiers, wait staff, etc; we were also able to take our first international mission trip as a family to Honduras where we served in an orphanage. This paved the way for our daughters to learn what it meant to live on mission.

As my daughters grew and moved on from Acteens, so did I. I transitioned to teaching women about missions, and my passion for spreading the Gospel only deepened. Before the pandemic, I had the incredible opportunity to lead groups of WMU ladies from across the state on several



mission trips to Armenia, where we shared Christ's love with Armenian women and Ladies from the South. These experiences reaffirmed my belief that missions is not just something we do; it's who we are.

Now, as the director of WMU at my church, Fairview Baptist of Statesville, North Carolina, I am humbled to continue serving and leading in the organization that has shaped me into the woman I am today. My journey through WMU has been one of growth, faith, and service, and I am grateful for every step along the way. Together, let us continue to ignite hearts for Christ and His mission, for the glory of God and the transformation of the world. As President of WMU North Carolina, I am committed to continuing the legacy of igniting hearts for Christ and His mission, just as mine was ignited many years ago.

# 5 Strategies for Creating Lasting Change



Why is change so hard for us? Why do we often resist change?

here are many reasons it can be hard to enact change. We resist change because it's different and new. We resist it because it's overwhelming or it's a situation we have not encountered before, and we often fear what we do not know.

We have to shift our mindset not to see all change as bad. In fact, change can be very good! But how do we create lasting change? A lot of times, we want to change things, but we aren't sure of the best way to go about it and how to make it stick. Here is the good news, change is possible! Here are 5 strategies and opportunities I have found helpful in creating lasting change.

#### **Strategies for Creating Lasting Change**

- 1) One small change at a time. People often resist change when it comes too suddenly, or it's too radical or different from what was there previously. Making small changes over time instead of big changes all at once helps people adjust better. It takes time for change to stick. You will have more success and transformation if you make changes gradually, one step at a time.
- 2) Create buy-in. We have an emotional connection to people, places, and things. When there is an emotional attachment involved, it's always harder to enact change. People do not buy into change if they can't see how it will benefit them or will benefit something close to their heart.

Lovett H. Weems Jr. says in his book *Take the Next Step*, "Lasting, transformational change grows out of the congregation's current sense of its story and its mission. Transformational leaders know how to build on the church's identity, making new ministries the natural extension of what has gone before. In other words, they know how to make the story of change the next chapter in the book of the congregation's life, rather than throwing the book away and trying to start over."

In theory, it sounds good to wipe the slate clean and start over, but coming through with a sledgehammer to your church programming won't help. You must get buy-in. You are never going to please everyone, but as much as possible, get buy-in from others. **Trust is essential in creating change.** We must trust someone before we can believe the change they want to make is a good one.

**3) Make people a part of the change.** It helps ease any feelings of uncertainty during times of transition. People will feel more empowered because they have some knowledge and investment in what changes are happening. Withholding information makes

people go on the defense. Be as transparent as possible about the changes you want to make and reasons for those changes.

- 4) Change must be flexible. We have to be able to adapt and willing to change the plan. This helps in addressing resistance, adjusting plans based on feedback, and ensuring that the change is sustainable and effective.
- 5) Set realistic goals. The process of implementing change can feel overwhelming for us, and that can make it hard to start. Be specific in your goals. Clearly define what you want to accomplish. Use S.M.A.R.T. goals. S.M.A.R.T. goals are Specific, Meaningful/Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time bound.

Don't give up if you try something new and it doesn't work the way you thought it would. Remember, change takes time. I know it's frustrating at times. Our culture is inundated with instant gratification. But remember, we aren't just seeking change, we are seeking transformation. Change that lasts, that is transformative, takes time and can't be rushed.

When you want to create change, whether personally, professionally, or in your church or organization, ask yourself:

- What is the purpose, outcome, or goal of this change?
- What action step are you willing to take to make the change?
- When and how will you do it?
- Who can help you or keep you accountable?
- What obstacle could possibly hold you back?
- What will you do when you reach your goal? Change is inevitable. Things change in our world every day, but we don't need to worry because we love and serve a God who is unchanging.
